Welcome to Calvary Episcopal Church.


Calvary is the home of a community of people who seek to make the church a place of welcome, service, and beauty.





I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. 4 For the LORD is good; his mercy is everlasting; \* and his faithfulness endures from age to age.


The Epistle Ephesians 1:15-23

The Holy Gospel Matthew 25:31-46

The Priest reads the Gospel, first saying.

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."







The Postlude

Final (Symphony No. 1)

Louis Vierne (1870-1937)

The Flowers are given to the glory of God by Lynne Lyndrup in loving memory of her nephew John Peter Lansinger.

#### **Choral Music Notes:**

Heinrich Schütz was a German composer during the early and middle 17<sup>th</sup> century. He studied in Venice with Giovanni Gabrieli, and spent a large portion of his career in Dresden. Psalm 100 comes from a collection of psalm text he set to music titled *Psalmen David*. One can notice the influence from Gabrieli in the double choir writing which features echoes between the two choirs. The piece is composed for two four-voice choirs and intended to have Baroque accompaniment called *continuo*. Schütz writes with practical flexibility such that the choirs could be doubled by instruments or the second choir could be played by instruments. This fits nicely with our current limit of four singers where the organ can take the second choir parts.

Harold Friedell was an American organist, composer, and educator. He taught at both Julliard and Union Seminary. He held many church positions during his life, but the most significant was his position as Organist and Master of the Choir at the historic St. Bartholomew's Church in New York City. He wrote many organ pieces and choral anthems. Friedell sets the hymn **King of Glory, King of Peace** in three stanzas, varying the treatment of his original melody in each stanza. In the first, he places the melody in the soprano. In the second stanza, he places it in the tenor, and in the final stanza he treats it in stretto (overlapping) in top-down order (soprano, alto, tenor, bass).

#### **Organ Music Notes:**

**Bach** composed his six organ trio sonatas for his eldest son, Wilhelm Friedemann, in order to teach him independence of feet and hands among other things. Despite the fact that these are teaching pieces, they are quite remarkable pieces of music. Trio sonatas in the Baroque era were typically composed for four instruments in three parts – two obligato parts (perhaps two violins) and the bass part called *basso continuo* (played by a cello and a harpsichord). In writing trio sonatas for organ solo, Bach had to combine these three parts such that one person could play them all simultaneously. Each hand takes an obligato part alone, and the feet take the bass part. In this way, the organist becomes a chamber ensemble all in one. This makes them rather demanding pieces to master, but incredibly rewarding to play and to hear. The first movement of the C major sonata is particularly light and jovial – a fitting celebration for Christ the King Sunday!

**Louis Vierne** was a French composer and organist, famously blind from birth, who held the post as organist at Notre Dame Cathedral for most of his career. He composed eight organ symphonies – a genre rather unique to France and started by Charles-Marie Widor. These pieces are born out of the unique French organs built by Aristide Cavaillé-Coll during the 19<sup>th</sup> century which had the capability to build dramatic crescendos with a breadth of Romantic sound much like an orchestra. Vierne's first organ symphony closes with a toccata which his friend, Widor, played at Vierne's wedding. It's dramatic, grandiose character is a fitting way to bring praise to God on this Christ the King Sunday.
