As of October 11, 2017, Calvary has received 41 commitment cards for a total of \$129,396.00. What a fantastic beginning!!

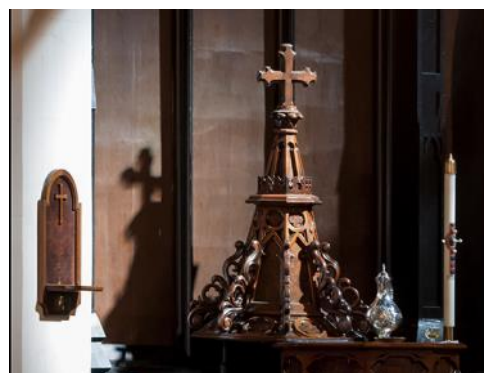

Calvary Rector Search

The Calvary Rector Search Committee will reconvene on Wednesday night, November 1st, to review the results of the Calvary Conversations conducted by the Vestry while creating our Strategic Plan. We hope to glean from these conversations a clearer vision of who Calvary is and the direction the Church wants to take.

Then, the following Wednesday, November 8th, we will review the Strategic Plan created by our Vestry. From this document we hope to learn the broad outreach of Calvary and the hopes and wishes for our future together as a "community of people who seek to make the church a place of welcome, service, and beauty."

The Congregational Assessment Tool (CAT) (<https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/calvarylouisville>) will close on Monday, October 23rd. HolyCow!, our consulting firm, will evaluate the results and send the conclusions of its study to the Bishop's office. On Wednesday, November 15th, we will meet with our Vestry and The Reverend Canon Amy Real Coultas to review and discuss the results.

It is our hope that by reviewing these three sources of information, we will be better equipped to write a profile for our next rector. Our goal is to post the profile in early January. Please pray for us as we endeavor to listen to God's voice in discerning the path Calvary should take.

Calvary Vestry to Review Draft Strategic Plan with Parish on November 5

Calvary's Vestry has been hard at work developing a Strategic Plan to guide in shaping Calvary's future. We would like to share our draft plan with you, the members of the congregation, and get your feedback and input before we finalize it.

Parish meeting:

- Sunday, Nov. 5 in Parker Hall, following the 11:00 am service.
- We will review the Draft Strategic Plan with you and ask for your suggestions. Please plan to attend and participate in shaping Calvary's future.

Why a Strategic Plan?

- Our Strategic Plan serves as a guide to help us achieve our mission to serve God.
- The plan presents our Mission, Vision, Core Values, Goals, Objectives, and also lists specific Benchmarks we can use to measure our success. It is meant to be a living document to guide us in developing our programs and in deciding where to invest our time, talents and resources.
- This plan will serve as a key pillar for the Search Committee's development of Calvary's profile. The Search Committee will use this as one resource when interviewing rector candidates, to help ensure our next rector will embrace the plan and enthusiastically lead us in implementing it.

Calvary's Mission

In thanksgiving for having been called as children of God to a life of service, we share with one another the love and obedience of Christ Jesus, our Lord. Calvary Church is a liturgical church seeking to bring Christ to a world in need.

Calvary's Vision

Calvary Church is the heart and face of the Episcopal Church, providing spiritual growth and ministry in the renaissance of downtown Louisville and surrounding neighborhoods.

Goals – at a high level, what we wish to accomplish.

1. Sustain integrated ministries of worship and music, Christian Formation, and parish life and care.
2. Deliver comfort for the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of our neighbors and beyond.
3. Connect with and be accepted by the surrounding community as a gracious and openhearted neighbor.
4. As a part of the larger Episcopal Church, pursue relationships with the Diocese, Episcopal organizations, and other churches that further mutual values, missions and goals.
5. Encourage and cultivate leadership, stewardship, and parishioner engagement to support Calvary's ability to grow and pursue its mission.
6. Pursue relationships with educational institutions and civic organizations that further mutual values, missions and goals.

Within each of these 6 Goals, we have drafted Objectives and Benchmarks.

The Vestry Voice

The Vestry met on Tuesday, October and discussed the following topics:

- The Ferguson Fund was closed and remaining monies were moved into Calvary Preservation account. The soon-to-be installed water fountain will be paid for in part with these funds.
- The parking lot was paved on October 12th. 1st Unitarian Church next door contributed 1/3rd of the cost for this project (Calvary and the Unitarian church own the lot jointly). Many thanks to Clyde Warner for overseeing this project and working with our neighbors.
- The 2018 budgeting process is underway. The Budget Committee met on October 12th and is working through each line item. Some have been referred to the Vestry to provide a recommendation, in particular staff salaries. We are expecting to use the full 5% endowment draw, with 90% going to operating expenses and 10% going to building preservation. The outreach budget is under review. Since there was a substantial gift for the use of Outreach, funds allocated to Outreach in the operating budget have been zero in recent years. With new ministries emerging, such as the Garden of Goodness/Lay Weeders, there will be costs associated with them so Jamie Hendon will communicate to the Budget Committee the Vestry recommendation of \$5,000 for this budget outside the grant money.
- The Every Member Canvass has one more week and has collected pledges of \$129,000 to date. Please submit your commitment cards so the budgeting process can work off the most accurate projections.
- In the Adult Forum, the newcomers “Episcopal Church 101” classes have been very popular. On November 5th, Brian Peel will be baptized and welcomed into Calvary’s community in Christ.
- The Communications Committee has been working on website upgrades in preparation for our Rector Search. Feedback is welcome! Many thanks to Carrie and Andy Frazier for their assistance to redesign the website. Also, the Committee asks that if you have a Facebook account, please share Calvary’s events and posts often! The more people we share our activities with, then we will have a larger presence in the community.
- Thanks to Jim Barnes for organizing a presentation by Diane Mouton from Jefferson Street Baptist Community at Liberty to talk about safety issues when ministering to those who are homeless and mentally ill.
- There was discussion around the personnel committee, with advice to add one more person to the current committee, to be consistent with the Calvary By-Laws. Meg Scharre will work on developing a roles and responsibilities description for this committee.
- A draft of the Strategic Plan was approved at the September Vestry meeting and the next step is to present it to the Congregation for further feedback. Please make every effort to come to the Parish meeting on November 5th after the 11 am service. (See the article in this Connection on the Strategic Plan for more information.)
- To date, 97 out of 250 have returned the Congregational Assessment Tool (CAT). This is very important to inform the work of the Rector Search Committee. The Vestry will be meeting with the Search Committee to review the findings on November 15th.

Stewardship & Outreach at Calvary

I don't know whether you have reached the same point in life I have that when I do something today that requires physical exertion, I know I'm going to feel it tomorrow - sore muscles, maybe a bruise or two, for sure a worn-out body. Not that I'm getting old; I've just reached a particular stage in life. That's what I tell myself anyway.

I've been graciously asked by the Stewardship Committee to speak this morning about community outreach ministries at Calvary. Two Sundays ago, John Hale eloquently reminded us that Calvary is called by God to be the body of Christ to our community, to be the face of Jesus to the people living in the neighborhood around us. John pointed out the vital ways that Calvary takes that call seriously by distributing bags of food and items of clothing, providing music lessons to neighborhood children, handing out water and sandwiches to the homeless, forming an urban partnership with other Episcopal churches, organizing free laundry nights for our neighbors, and maintaining a garden of vegetables and flowers for our community. Jim Hill last Sunday challenged us to expand our vision of outreach even further by partnering with organizations and ministries to help people in crisis in ways that Calvary is unable to do alone. Jim and John's testimonies of Calvary's outreach ministries resonated with my experience at Calvary. This congregation profoundly understands the challenges we face in striving to be the body of Christ, the face of Jesus, to the people who come to us and to those we reach out to. That this congregation does not back off from that challenge is certain. We are unafraid to do the hard work that is necessary in being an active and compassionate downtown church. And it is hard and tiring work, and for me, at times, it's overwhelming to face the great and growing needs, the desperation and sadness of the people we seek to love and minister to.

So, it was that a few weeks ago on a Sunday morning I sat in this church - a bruised soul with a heart and a mind that wanted, needed to feel some assurance that 'God, you are still here, still with us in the midst of the suffering we see and seek to ease.' I thought about staying home and not coming back to church for Evensong. I was tired and sore. But a small voice, a feeling, something nudged me to go back, and so that afternoon I helped to hand out bulletins and then sat in the back of the church. At first I heard, but then as the inspired music of Calvary drew me in, I listened; to the choir of the Youth Performing Arts School, who then joined Calvary's choir to sing Evensong. And each time as the music climbed and soared, I too was lifted up, taken to another place - sacred and holy. I heard the beauty of God, and my bruised soul was touched and healed.

Benedictine monks stop whatever they are doing and gather seven times a day to sing the Psalms and their prayers. When asked the reason for singing rather than reciting the daily services, one monk responded that Benedictines believe that the angels in heaven never stop in singing praises to God. By singing, the monks are joining their voices with the voices of angels in an unceasing heavenly choir.

Thank you, Calvary members and leaders of Calvary's choir, as you lifted your voices to join the angels in heaven in praising God during Evensong, and for taking me along with you. The music at Calvary is special, blessed by God.

Outreach ministries and music at Calvary Episcopal Church - together we are one, a living part of the body of Christ, the face of Jesus.

Calvary is Reading

Novels and the latest best sellers are not the only thing Calvary members are reading. There is a lot of variety in this month's books.

Beth Collier Vail recently read ***The Miracle Morning: The Not-So-Obvious Secret Guaranteed to Transform Your Life (Before 5AM)*** by Hal Elrod and comments "while it's not a novel, it's given me some ideas on facing my days with a refreshed attitude!"

Denise Snow Wilson had been reading a lot of textbooks while finishing up her Master's degree but before that she read and enjoyed: ***Mr. Pip*** by Lloyd Jones, ***Beautiful Ruins (P.S.)*** by Jess Walter, ***The Telling Room: A Tale of Love, Betrayal, Revenge, and the World's Greatest Piece of Cheese*** by Michael Paterniti, ***Dream of Scipio*** by Iain Pears and "my all-time favorite" ***The God of Small Things*** by Arundhati Roy. This novel has been compared favorably to the works of Faulkner and Dickens, and is described by a reviewer as a modern classic that has been read and loved worldwide. Equal parts powerful family saga, forbidden love story, and piercing political drama, it is the story of an affluent Indian family forever changed by one fateful day in 1969.

Jim Barnes is reading ***The Liturgical Mysteries*** by Mark Schweitzer. The author is an American musician, composer, writer, and music professor and according to a reviewer his books will have "you rolling in the aisles".

Ginger Ray has been a member of a book club for many years and not only enjoys the fellowship but also because it prompts her to read books that she might have selected otherwise. She has been reading: ***The Hillbilly Elegy*** by J.D. Vance, ***A Gentleman in Moscow: A Novel*** by Amor Towles, not only a New York Times bestseller but selected as book of the year by NPR and several leading newspapers. Also, ***Cathedral of the Wild: An African Journey Home*** by Boyd Varty who grew up Londolozi Game Reserve in South Africa, and ***The Signature of All Things*** another NYT bestseller by Elizabeth Gilbert who also wrote ***Eat, Pray, Love***.

My most current plane book was ***The Snowman*** by Jo Nesbø Norwegian crime-writer Jo Nesbø. It is the seventh entry in his Harry Hole series. It is a dark and explicit novel that is being into a movie. It is first time I had read this particular author and it is not for the faint of heart.

What is the spiritual value of a garden? How can gardening be a religious expression?

Thomas Berry, Catholic priest, theologian, and author of *The Sacred Universe: Earth, Spirituality, and Religion in the Twenty-first Century*, explains that religious experience emerges out of the wonder we feel when we encounter the inexplicable grandeur of the natural world - the artistry in a flower, the hymns of birds and bees, the greenness of a garden. And he warns us that we are in danger of losing our souls when we lose a sense of the sacredness of the Earth's creative processes. For at the center of the natural world and the cosmos is God's beating heart of life, love, and compassion. 'Greening Power' is the term coined by Hildegard of Bingen to describe the spirit of life found in all the beauty of this world. "There is power in eternity, and it is green. The Spirit goes out, grows, and produces fruit. This is life!" It is that life we see, hear, feel in a garden - a dwelling place for God.
